Many law students have participated in the Boren Awards program, studying languages, taking law-related coursework, and researching legal issues in Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America, and the Middle East. Below are examples of what law students have done overseas with a Boren Award:

- Studied Japanese criminal law and law enforcement system at Keio University
- Enrolled in classes on Islamic law and legal institutions at the University of Science and Technology in Jordan
- Interviewed and observed lawyers, law professors, and NGO personnel regarding advocacy strategies employed by South African human rights lawyers
- Investigated Kazakhstan's implementation of legislation related to the protection of ethnic minorities and the promotion of stability between different ethnic groups
- Researched the problems regarding Economic Land Concessions and land registration in Cambodia and assessed solutions for the national and local governments
- Interned in India to study the political challenges to power sector reform and to assist with implementing regulations

Examples of Service:

Boren Alumni who have graduated from law school have fulfilled their service in a variety of federal positions including:

- A federal clerkship that included serving as a delegate in Russia to conduct a clinic on jury trials
- A position at the Department of the Interior coordinating departmental policy on legislation related to homeland security
- A position with the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs developing policies on international narcotics and crime
- A trial attorney for the Computer Crime and Intellectual Property Section of the U.S. Department of Justice Criminal Division
- A position at the United States Air Force Judge Advocate Corps
